

## GENERAL X-RAY PATIENT INFORMATION

### What is an X-ray?

An x-ray involves exposing a part of the body to a small dose of ionising radiation in order to produce an image of the inside of the body. X-rays are a very useful tool in diagnosing and treating medical conditions.

### What preparation is involved?

No preparation is involved for a general x-ray.

### Can I take my medications as normal?

You can take all your medications as normal.

### What will happen during the examination?

You may be asked to remove some or all of your clothing and to put on a hospital gown for the x-ray, depending on the part of your body being x-rayed. You may also be asked to remove jewellery or any metal objects as these can interfere with the x-ray. The radiographer will then position you in order to

obtain the requested x-ray images. You will be required to stay still while the x-ray image is taken. You may then be repositioned several times and the process repeated in order to obtain all the x-ray views requested. The radiographer will then review all the images taken and once all satisfactory images are obtained your examination is complete.

### How long will the examination take?

The x-rays will usually take 5-30 minutes, depending on how many different views / images your doctor has requested.

### Are there any risks?

When having an x-ray you will receive a small dose of x-ray radiation. The potential benefits of diagnosing a medical condition are believed to be greater than the risks from receiving a small dose of x-ray radiation.

**Before your x-ray please let the Radiographer know if you are, or think you may be pregnant.**

### Please Note:

#### Please bring the following to your appointment:

- Request form (if referral from GP / Specialist)
- Medicare Card
- Any relevant previous x-rays

#### Obtaining your results:

Your images will be processed and then reported by a Radiologist. A copy of the report will be sent back to the doctor / specialist who referred you for the examination.

You will need to follow up the results of your examination with your referring doctor / specialist.

After the examination is complete a radiologist will review the images taken and produce a report. This report and a copy of the images taken will then be forwarded to the doctor who referred you for the examination.
